Entrenchment of power hierarchies through epistemic binarisms

Theology: sinful v. non-sinful

Secular morality: harmful v. non-harmful

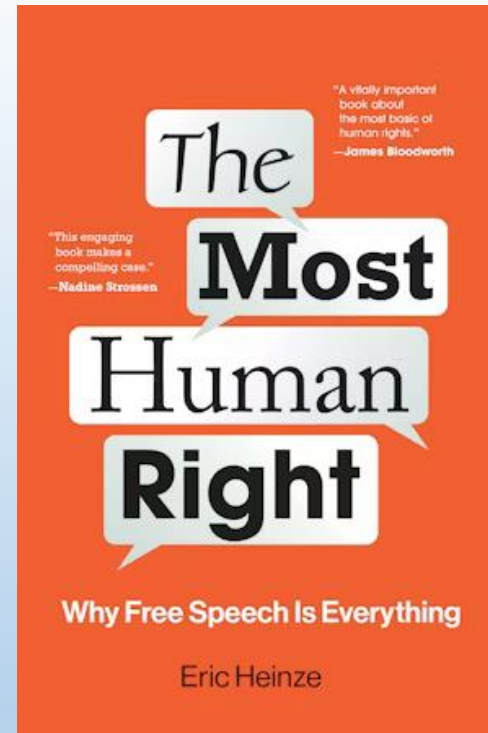
Empirical science: pathological v. normal

Debates about trans women: biological v. social

Theology, secular morality, empiricism: Free speech not irrelevant but already assumed

Free speech is never epistemically distinct from a substantive controversy (cf. 'checklist' conception)
